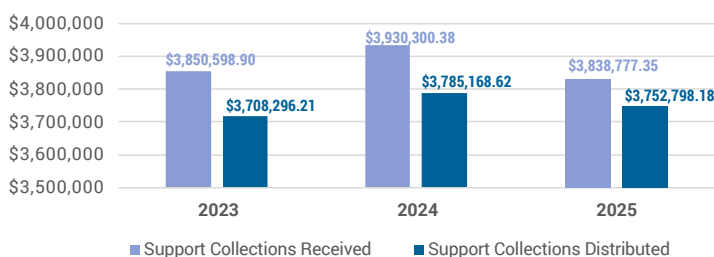

Summer Splash with Dads

The PCJFS Child Support Team hosted three Summer Splash with Dad pool parties in 2025. One took place on June 11 in Somerset, the next one was on June 18 in New Lexington, and the third and final party was held on June 25 in Crooksville. Each year, Child Support organizes these events to celebrate and encourage responsible and involved fathers and offer an opportunity for fathers and their children to enjoy a day at the pool together. These continue to be popular events with an average of 40 attendees at each party.



CHILD SUPPORT SUCCESS STORY

A child support caseworker was able to start collecting on two cases where the same absent father had not made a payment in years. Payments are now coming in regularly from the father's employer. This has generated financial help for the custodial mother that she had not received previously.

The children services team works to inspire hope and healing for children and families by ensuring safety, providing support, and achieving permanency. Programs include Intake and Ongoing Services, Foster Care and Adoption Services, and the School Outreach Program.

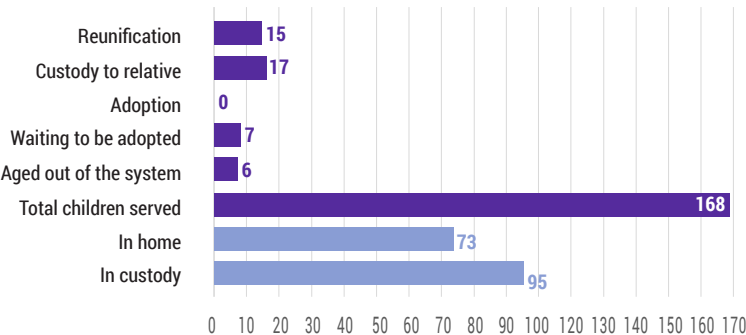

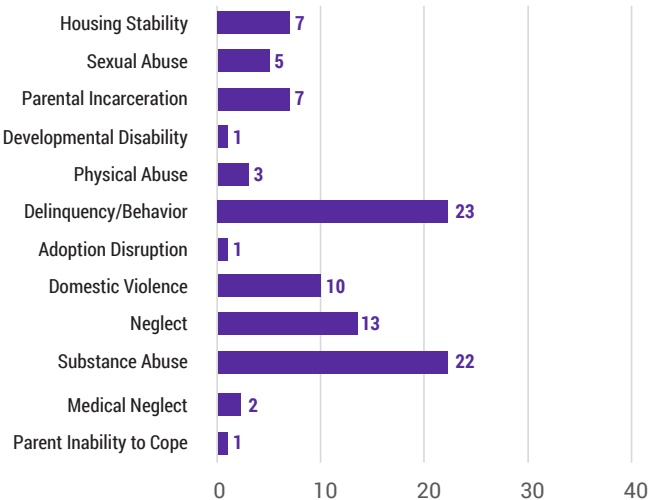


STATE FISCAL YEAR 2025

CHILDREN WHO GAINED PERMANENCY THROUGH:

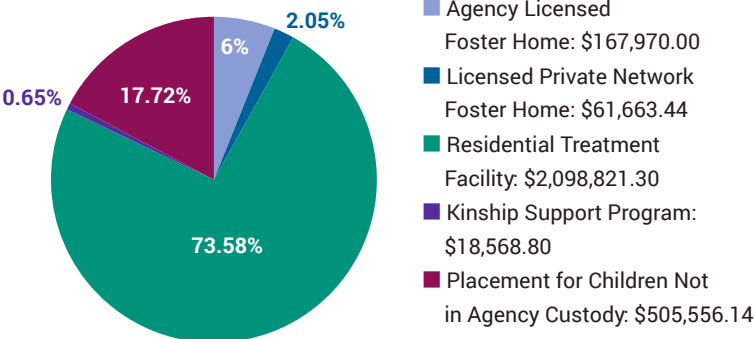


PRIMARY REASON FOR REMOVAL

PRACTICE IN ACTION TOGETHER (PACT)

PACT stands for “Practice in Action Together,” and is designed to help us shape our practice to achieve better results with the children and families with whom we work. Our Local Advisory Group for PACT has entered its second year of implementation. Our Local Advisory Group is comprised of staff, administration, ex-foster and adoptive parents, youth with lived experience in foster care, and parents with lived experience working with child welfare. We have updated our charter to reflect shared values and are beginning testing of strategies that will be utilized to help us ensure that the families we work with feel included, are listened to, and are recognized as the expert on their own lives. As a Cohort 1 county, Perry County is currently visiting with other counties that are in the beginning stages of PACT implementation and sharing our experiences to aid them in forming their own local advisory committees.

OHIO START

Ohio START, which stands for Sobriety, Treatment and Reducing Trauma, is a groundbreaking program adopted by ODJFS, PCJFS, and the Public Children Services Association of Ohio (PCSAO) and aimed at providing a way for families dealing with substance use and child welfare issues to gain safety and sobriety while maintaining family unification. In 2025, we had four Ohio START cases which served five adults and 12 children. START prevented 11 children from coming into custody. To date, START has successfully closed two of the four cases.

CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES SUCCESSES

Our unit worked with a developmentally delayed mother who had just given birth to a healthy baby. Unfortunately, due to the delays of the mother and housing issues, the mother could not properly and safely care for her child. Through a successful Interstate Agreement, the child was placed in the legal custody of family members. The mother is still able to visit with the child and get updates on the child weekly and will have in-person visits as the family travels to Ohio. The child is in a loving and stable family with the mother and father’s direct inclusion in his life.

A teenager in our permanent custody who experienced a disrupted adoption and was in a long-term placement in a group home was able to transition to a home with a kinship provider. This child is doing incredibly well in this home and has bonded with his caregivers. A home environment is best for children and due to this person being willing to take in this child, he is now experiencing a more normal childhood.





PCJFS held its inaugural Night of Hope Dinner and Awards on November 6, 2025, at The Barn at Backwoods, marking a heartfelt evening dedicated to celebrating the power of hope, healing, and human connection.

Inspired by the “Together We Can” event hosted by the Perry County Board of Developmental DisABILITIES (PCBDD), PCJFS Night of Hope honored the incredible stories of youth, families, and organizations touched by the child welfare system.

Guests were inspired by a dynamic keynote address from Lara LaRoche, a practice implementation adviser with Public Children Services Association of Ohio, whose message highlighted what she affectionately calls “Perrydise,” a place defined by unity, strength, and unique partnerships that make Perry County truly special. She reminded guests that when communities work together, hope doesn’t just survive, it thrives.

During the awards ceremony, each honoree was celebrated through video tributes filled with messages of love and encouragement from friends, family, and colleagues.

ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES

Adult protective services are available to help vulnerable adults age 60 and older who are in danger of harm, are unable to protect themselves, and may have no one to assist them. We continue to invest in programs designed to support and protect our aging population, as funding allows. Through targeted initiatives, older adults receive food assistance, fraud prevention education, and opportunities to enhance digital skills through our Senior Tech Program. Additional supports include homemaker services, housing assistance, accessibility improvements such as ramps and medical equipment, and utility assistance to help seniors remain safe and independent in their homes. These essential services are made possible through special grant funding, including the Adult Protective Services (APS) Stimulus Grant and Title XX funding, which together strengthen our community's ability to promote dignity, independence, and quality of life for older adults.

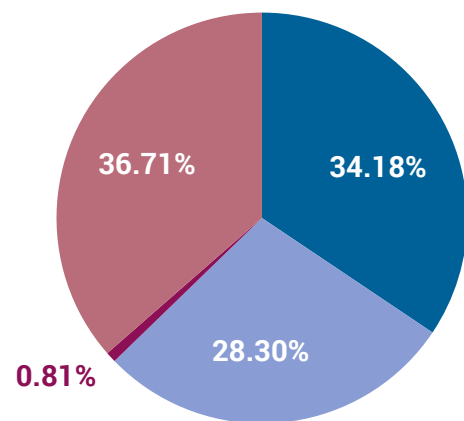
WORLD ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS DAY (WEAAD)

The 2025 WEAAD was held on June 13, and the theme was home safety. PCJFS provided items and information to help seniors stay safe and secure in their homes. Chief Deputy Eric Hoskinson of the Perry County Sheriff's Office opened the event with current trends related to senior safety and crime. PCJFS provided a Home Safety Kit to the first 100 attendees who were 60 years or older. The Home Safety Kit addressed the adult's ability to be safe in their home in a variety of ways – from security to completing tasks in a safe and independent manner. Items included in the bag consisted of a door/window alarm, a diversion book safe, indoor motion sensor light, and a phone/key finder with an insulated lunch bag. Lunch was catered by Trotters Bar and Grill.

Katz Cleaning and an APS worker got together last year and cleaned out an APS client's apartment that was bedbug infested and worked with Passport to get her treatment. Her apartment manager almost served her an eviction because of clutter, bugs, and hazards in the apartment that were resolved through support with Buckeye Hills Regional Agency on Aging and JFS Homemaker services.



Public Assistance



PERRY COUNTY
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The PCJFS Public Assistance Unit administers government programs designed to provide support and resources to individuals and families in need. Program eligibility is often based on factors such as income, age, employment status, and veteran status. Benefits range from cash assistance to housing assistance, and help with things like nutrition benefits, health care coverage, childcare needs, non-emergency medical transportation, kinship services, and prevention, retention, and contingency services to help people overcome immediate barriers to self-sufficiency. The PCJFS Public Assistance Unit works to administer the programs accurately and efficiently for eligible Perry County residents.

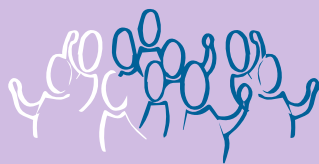

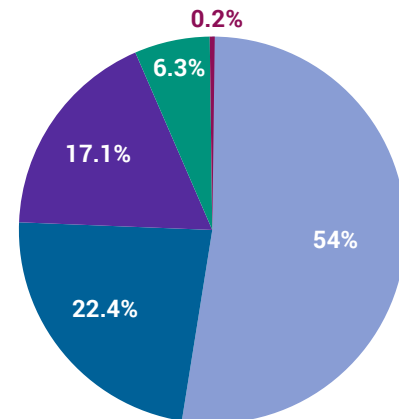


Medicaid expansion has been shown to cut the uninsured rate among low-income adults by nearly three percentage points compared to non-expansion states; a significant public health and economic benefit.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE SUCCESS STORIES

One of our PCJFS Public Assistance Specialists went above and beyond to help a mother obtain her son's prescription before many physician offices and pharmacies closed for the weekend. The pharmacy initially indicated there was no insurance coverage for the medication. The specialist promptly contacted the managed care provider to investigate the issue, identified and corrected the problem with the case, and ensured the coverage processed successfully so the child was able to receive his necessary medication before the weekend.



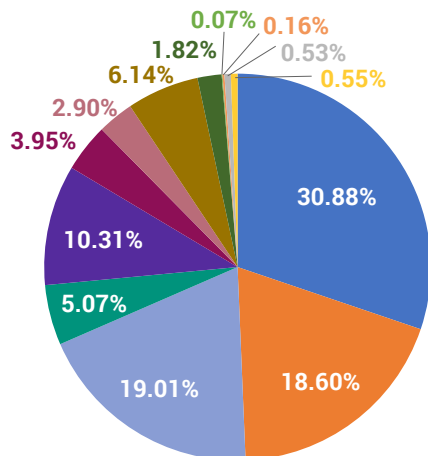
The goal of the PCJFS Workforce Unit is to help households increase financial self-sufficiency, remove barriers to employment and training, and provide supportive services necessary to enter or stay in the workforce.

PREVENTION, RETENTION, CONTINGENCY PROGRAM (PRC)

The PRC Program of Perry County is designed to provide benefits and services to low-income families to overcome immediate barriers that prevent the achievement of self-sufficiency by promoting work and personal responsibility. To qualify, families must meet requirements related to income, household composition, and employment. In addition to core services, the Workforce Unit operates a diaper bank, a professional clothing closet, and a shelf-stable food pantry to assist individuals and families experiencing emergency needs. These resources are available to help remove immediate barriers and support stability during times of crisis.

WORKFORCE INNOVATION & OPPORTUNITY ACT (WIOA) PROGRAM

A primary service administered by the Workforce Unit is the Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) Program. The WIOA Program offers in-demand training for youth ages 14-24, adults who are income eligible, and dislocated workers (those who have been laid off are automatically eligible with proof of lay-off or proof of unemployment insurance payments). The training cap is \$25k per program year for two years. The supportive services cap is \$10k for the duration of a participant's enrollment. Supportive services include gas vouchers, equipment, uniforms, clothing, etc. The Workforce Unit provides case management during the enrollment period and completes follow-up for the year after disenrollment to track the participant's employment and wage status.

WIOA – IN SCHOOL

Case management for workforce and training opportunities for in-demand job fields for students aged 14 through graduation. It provides incentives for attendance, good grades, and graduation.

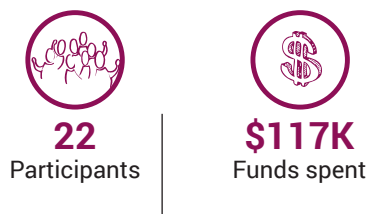
OHIO DEPARTMENT OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

This Ohio Department of Behavioral Health funds grant offers support for behavioral health-related workforce training. (formerly Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services.) This grant provides up to \$25k in training expenses per participant, plus various supportive services. Totals for the duration of the grant through 2025:



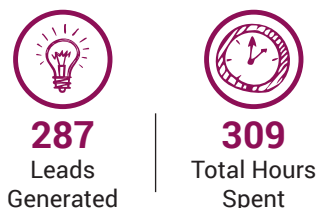
BENEFIT BRIDGE PROGRAM

This intensive case management program focuses on single parent households that have seen a reduction in SNAP benefits. It provides payment for training such as Phlebotomy, EKG, and STNA Certificates as well as other supportive services such as uniforms and gas vouchers, incentives, and more to help move participants to self-sufficiency. This unique pilot program is aimed at addressing the “benefit cliff” in which an increase in income results in a significant loss in benefits.



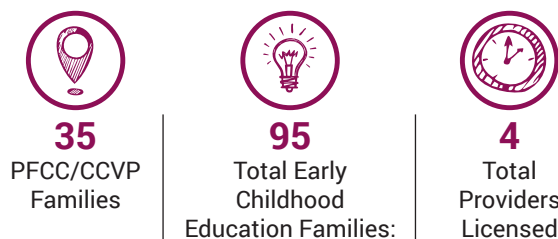
ADULT OUTREACH

This program provides for a Workforce Unit case worker to be present at community events and frequented locations throughout Perry County providing information and resources about PCJFS programming.



CHILDCARE

The Workforce Unit conducts childcare licensing and eligibility work. This unit licenses and monitors Type A, Type B, and In-Home Aid childcare homes along with determining eligibility for publicly funded childcare, the childcare choice voucher program, and early childhood and education programs by processing applications.



COMPREHENSIVE CASE MANAGEMENT EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (CCMEP) AND WORK PLUS

PCJFS works in conjunction with Hocking-Athens-Perry County Community Action Partnership (HAPCAP) to serve Perry County youth ages 14-24 who are income eligible year-round and during the summer. Enrolled youth receive personalized case management to plan for the future while also receiving incentives for educational activities. During the summer, youth may be able to participate in summer employment for six to eight weeks paid at a rate of \$12.50 per hour.



RE-EMPLOYMENT SERVICES AND ELIGIBILITY ASSESSMENT (RESEA) PROGRAM

This program offers individual re-employment services case management for selected Unemployment Insurance (UI) recipients, including resume building, job search, UI assistance, and more!

YOUTH OUTREACH

Workforce case workers in New Lexington, Crooksville, Sheridan, Tri-County, JA Inspire, and Miller High Schools provide individualized coaching on employment, training, and life planning opportunities.

16TH ANNUAL BACK-TO-SCHOOL BASH

In 2025, we served 540 families, which included 1,013 students at our 16 Annual Back-to-School Bash which was held on August 6. We had 33 vendors that joined us for the event, and we received \$6,075 in charitable donations, which included \$1,500 from The Elks and \$2,000 from The Eagles. The Perry County Health Department, Perry County Public Library, Genesis, and Mt. Aloysius also sponsored activities at the event.

NON-EMERGENCY MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION (NEMT)

PCJFS provides non-emergency transportation services for Medicaid beneficiaries, ensuring they can access healthcare appointments safely and reliably. These services are offered at no cost to eligible individuals, removing barriers to care and supporting the health and well-being of our community members. By helping residents get to and from medical appointments, these services promote independence, timely healthcare access, and overall quality of life.

WORKFORCE UNIT SUCCESSES

★ Carlie D. entered the Benefit Bridge program on SNAP, Medicaid, and Childcare. She enrolled in WIOA to cover her tuition for Dental Hygiene. At that time, Carlie was unemployed and living with her parents. After 18 months in the Benefit Bridge program, she graduated from college with her Dental Hygiene license and is now earning \$48 an hour as a dental hygienist, all while carrying virtually no debt. As of March 2025, she is no longer receiving SNAP benefits and is living independently with her children. Additionally, her daughter is receiving assistance through our childcare program to cover preschool costs.

★ Haley I. joined the Benefit Bridge program while working on call at Genesis, where she was enrolled in the WIOA for LPN. At that time, she was receiving Medicaid, SNAP, and childcare benefits. Throughout her journey in the Benefit Bridge program, she completed her LPN and went on to earn her RN, becoming a licensed registered nurse with an hourly wage of \$24.54. As of December 2023, she is no longer receiving SNAP benefits; however, her daughter is enrolled in preschool childcare, and they continue to receive Medicaid assistance.

★ Kayla P.'s journey with the Benefit Bridge program began while she worked as a dental assistant. Residing with her aunt and awaiting housing assistance, Kayla received SNAP benefits, childcare support, and Medicaid for herself and her two young children. Her son participated in the Comprehensive Case Management and Employment Program (CCMEP) and the Work+ summer employment program. With support from the Individual Training Plan (ITP), Kayla completed her dental assisting training. Her ambitions didn't stop there; she was accepted into an Expanded Function Dental Auxiliary (EFDA) program, where she excelled and received her licensing approval. Today, Kayla earns \$31 an hour at a dental office and has successfully transitioned away from SNAP benefits, marking a significant milestone in her professional and personal journey.

★ A 2025 summer youth employee, who worked at Value Auto Auction, was offered a permanent position at the end of the summer program. The participant was initially very shy and hesitant, but she quickly opened up and many staff there felt she may have found her niche. The youth remains employed in this position and is continuing to do well in her role.





WORKFORCE SUCCESS STORIES

Nathan recently reached out to share that he has accepted a full-time teaching position with the University of West Virginia. He expressed deep gratitude for the support he received, especially the opportunity to participate in a mock teaching lesson. That experience proved to be a pivotal moment, as it helped him refine his delivery and build confidence. During his interview, WVU was highly impressed with his presentation skills and teaching style, ultimately leading to a job offer on the spot. Nathan's success is a powerful example of how preparation, practice, and support can come together to create life-changing opportunities.
